"He was not so much of a tinkerer as an observer," Richard Linn said. "He was a very quiet person, very smart, very off-the-wall. They used to call him 'Crazy Karl' in high school because they never knew what he would do next.

After James River, Linn joined the Marine Corps Reserve but chose a delayed-entry program so he could start college. He enrolled in the mechanical-engineering program at Virginia Commonwealth University and participated in "weekend warrior" basic training while attending classes, specializing in combat engineering.

Then, last year, Linn's unit was activated. They were sent into combat in November.

Between missions, Linn was keeping himself busy e-mailing his family, playing with his Canon PowerShot A60 digital camera and updating his new Web site, www.karl.

"Other than being tired recently because of 12-hour days patrolling, he'd say the food was lousy and it was chilly," Richard Linn said yesterday. "He was more concerned about when we were sending him more socks and gummy bears, which were apparently in short supply.'

Even though he was able to call home only once, at Christmas, his family could see his adventures online. They knew he was safe.

On Wednesday morning, Richard Linn was 40 miles north of Richmond on a business trip when he got a call from his mother. The Marines wanted to talk to him at home.

"You're never prepared. My wife just didn't even want to think about it. She was always scared, from the time he was in boot camp, but she hoped and prayed and tried not to dwell on it. I knew this could happen. I felt the odds were good that it wouldn't, but I've never been a gambling man."

Linn is survived by his father and mother, Malisa, and brother, Tan, who is 15 and a sophomore at James River.

## Iraqis cast ballots in Australia

Expatriates jostle to be among the first to vote in the historic election

SYDNEY, Australia — Iraqi expatriates began casting ballots today, several jostling to be among the first to vote in Iraq's first independent elections in more than

Amid tight security at a converted furniture warehouse, young children mingled with elderly Kurdish women in head-totoe black robes.

"This is a long dream that now comes true," said 56-year-old Karim Jari before casting his vote.

Australia is one of 14 nations where Iraqis living outside their country can vote — and the first country to begin collecting ballots because of its time zone. In Iraq, the vote is Sunday; elsewhere, it runs today through Sunday.

Many historians consider the last free elections in Iraq to have taken place in 1953.

Nearly 12,000 Iraqi exiles registered to vote in Australia, around 15 percent of the estimated 80,000 eligible Iraqi nationals.

Organizers originally hoped that as many as 50,000 Iraqis would join the

electoral rolls Australia but downgraded their expec tations after a poor showing last week, say-

ing fear and apathy were keeping people away from the polls.

In the other countries, less than a quarter of the 1.2 million eligible expatriate Iraqis had registered by Tuesday's deadline.

The low numbers have been attributed to a shortage of registration and polling places, a disorganized election effort, fears of violence or reprisals and conflicts with the Muslim holiday of Eid-al-Adha, or Feast of Sacrifice, which coincides with the yearly pilgrimage to Mecca in Saudi Arabia.

Votes also may be cast in the United States, Britain, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, Iran, Jordan, the Netherlands, Sweden, Syria, Turkey and United Arab Emirates.

Meanwhile yesterday in Baghdad, U.S. troops packed extra uniforms and ammunition before moving out of their main base to take up positions around the city, part of a massive security operation to protect voters.

Iraqi police and soldiers will play the more visible role, manning checkpoints and securing the polls — many of which already have been bombed and rocketed by insurgents.

American troops will be around, nonetheless — backing up the Iraqis, U.S. and Iraqi commanders said.

The U.S. presence could make American troops easier targets, and it also has raised concerns the United States might be seen as orchestrating the elections.

About 300,000 Iraqi, U.S. and other multinational troops and police will provide security for the voting, which will take place at 5,300 polling centers.
